Upon graduation, she worked her way up through internships and early PR roles, filled with determination to build a life as a professional as well as pursuing personal happiness.

Samantha worked as a PR specialist in the Philadelphia area for over 25 years doing work she loved and met the retirement of her career in her late 50s, at the height of her career. She had achieved the balance she always dreamed of, a fulfilling career along side a rich family life. She

then spent her retirement years traveling with her husband, volunteering with animals, and spending time with her children, and grandchildren.

Samantha was married for over 50 years to her husband whom she had met in her early 20s. Together they built a beautiful home that was filled with warmth and welcomed all friends and family. They often hosted family gatherings and dinners, and made everyone feel like they were at home.

She survived by her husband, three children, seven grandchildren and her two beloved golden retrievers. Her legacy will not just be found in the career she built, but even more so in the lives of her family and loved ones.
